Communications

- 24/7 Emergency Dispatch Center for the majority of local Fire and EMS agencies
- Specialty response for interoperable communications

Fire

- Coordinate training programs for career and volunteer departments, from entry to officer levels and specialty classes:
 - Host two Career Fire Academies per year as well as the Yonkers Academy
 - Offer Firefighter I Programs through several schedules to meet the needs of volunteers
- Mutual aid coordination
- Specialty response hazardous materials, technical rescue, Grasslands Brigade, Arson Task Force

EMS

- Basic Life Support First Responder Program: provide EMS for County facilities and events
- Mutual aid coordination
- Coordinate a variety of continuing education and training programs for EMS

Emergency Management

- Manage the County's Emergency Operations Center disaster coordination, response and municipal support
- Facilitate/support county-wide emergency preparedness, planning, mitigation, and response –
 including resources, equipment, supplies, training and exercises
